Swimming gold medallist Adam Peaty opens showpiece leisure centre

Rio Olympics hero admits: 'I was scared of water

as a child'

OLYMPIC swimming hero Adam Peaty opened the £9m state-of-the-art Holly Hill Leisure Centre and admitted:

"Although it might be hard to believe, I was actually scared of water when I was younger."

Adam, who triumphed at the Rio Olympics by winning Team GB's first gold medal in the 100m breaststroke breaking his world record set the day before, was acutely afraid of being bathed as a young boy.

The 21-year-old super star was full of praise for the It's not often you get a swimming lesson from an Olympic champion. showpiece centre in Sarisbury which boasts a 25-metre pool with 6 lanes and a learner pool, gym, spinning room and dance centre.

In a landmark day for the Western Wards, he told guests: "I know how important it is that we educate more people about the health and safety benefits of swimming, especially those who live in coastal areas such as Fareham.

"I think the pool here at Holly Hill Leisure Centre will go a long way in helping to do that.

"It's also at local pools like these where future athletes are discovered and, for me, it's



that could happen here at Holly Hill."

A plague was unveiled at the centre by Adam and the Mayor of Fareham, Councillor Connie Hockley.

Fareham Council Leader Seán Woodward said: "This is the delivery of my longest standing pledge, made over 25 years ago, and I am so grateful to all those who made it possible.

"It is the culmination of a project which began after our suggestion, strongly supported by residents, that we needed another swimming pool in the Borough."

Over 2,000 people have signed up for membership and the centre is open to all.

Fareham's Conservative-run Council has also provided new sports pitches near the leisure centre, worked with volunteers to improve the woodland and lake and has also agreed a £130,000 multi-use games area which will be provided in the new year.

Drivers asked to be patient as £90m road improvements move apace

AN APPEAL for drivers to be patient during major road works disruptions around Segensworth has come from the town's two Conservative County Councillors.

Work was starting on October 24 to widen the A27 between Segensworth roundabout and the Titchfield gyratory to 2 lanes in both directions.

Councillor Chris Matthews said: "I know there has been a lot of disrup-

tion to journey times with the Peel Common roundabout improvements and those between Gudge Heath Lane and the station roundabout but these improvements are vital for the local economy."

The **Conservative**-led County Council, despite ongoing cuts in Government funding, is investing £90m in road improvements and, thanks to the hard work of local

councillors, many improvements are being made locally.

Councillor Peter Latham said: "This considerable investment in road maintenance and improvement demonstrates that we have the capacity to prioritise schemes which will ensure economic growth, improve journey times and road safety and provide better access to employment for people in the local area."



Favourable comments

The Alexander Grove footbridge handrail is scheduled to be repainted in October. sooner if possible.

Councillor Dennis Steadman said: "I have received many favourable comments from residents who walk through the Gillies concerning the many improvements that have been made this year."

Also in Alexander Grove the wild flower gardens have eventually come good this year with a small showing of wild flowers after a long barren period.

A weedy problem

Weed growth in kerb channels and footpaths is causing problems.

Unfortunately, the County Council does not have the resources to scrape them out - a short-term measure because it doesn't kill the roots.

Councillor Dennis Steadman said: "They are better dealt with chemicals by HCC contractors, but as this year has seen exceptional growth they are well behind schedule with Fareham area listed for the end of October - weather permitting."

Ward gardeners win golds

Since its start in 1996, Fareham in Bloom has blossomed into one of the most popular annual competitions.

Fareham South entrants played their part among the hundreds of entries.

We had 14 winners, capturing a gold and category award, 6 gold awartds, 5 silver gilt, and 2 bronze.

And the Borough won the top award in the small city category in the South and South East in Bloom competition for the 13th consecutive year.

Action to deal with rat invasion

A COUPLE complained a brick planter outside Seal have seen rats their Gosport Road home was used by the public as a rubbish tip and infested by rats.

Mr and Mrs Barry Seal said the it was a decorative feature, but had been left to deteriorate. despite their public-spirited efforts to keep it tidy. Conservative Councillor Dennis Steadman took their complaints to the Borough Council's Streetscene department.

He said: "Over the years, the growth had reached a point where drastic action was needed.

"It has been used by the public as a waste tip with beer cans, old food boxes, rotting food, broken glass etc being thrown there. Mr and Mrs there.

The Council responded quickly and the Streetscene operations manager visited the site to discuss the issue with Mr and Mrs Seal.

As a result, work was carried out to clear the mess and cut the foliage.

He added: "This is another example of the very efficient way that our Council officers work. We are fortunate to have such a wonderful staff."

County red tape forces octogenerians to live under 'canopy of darkness'

THESE worried elderly residents are forced to live under 'a canopy of darkness' because the County Council refuses to deal with a huge clump of trees over-shadowing their homes.

The residents, all in their 80s, have made 3 approaches to HCC in the past 9 years and have just had to endure another dark summer while local government red tape persists.

Conservative Councillor Dennis Steadman said: "I visited the homes in Bishopsfield Road on a bright day in August just after midday and was amazed by the closeness and density of the trees and the canopy of darkness that enshrouded me.

"These large trees, consisting of two very large oaks and an even larger chestnut standing within 21 feet of their small front gardens.

"We sat together in the front room of one house and the lights had to be switched on. It seems very unfair to me."

Dennis has contacted Hampshire County Council's arboriculture officers on numerous occasions, asking for site visits and questioning whether there is a Human Rights issue.

Officers last inspected the site on September 23, but declared that unless there is a safety/damage concern to the public, ie branches broken or decayed and in danger of falling, no action can be

Dennis added: "Hampshire County Council appreciate the difficulties being experienced by residents, but it is bound by policy unless instructed otherwise.

"I am really sad not to be able to help these people with this problem."

Keith deals with 'misbehiving' bees

A LOCAL apiarist came to the rescue when bees swarmed into the roof of a resident's home in Coniston Walk.

Owner Mrs Rita Collis had been trying to get them removed for 2 years, but failed as honey bees are a protected species. So she contacted Conservative Councillor Keith Barton who

knew a beekeeper in Portchester, Robin Chandeler.

Keith said: "Robin assessed the situation and, with the cooperation of the Borough Council, scaffolding was erected and workers donned protective clothing to go up and remove several fascia panels.

The bees were lured out by first removing the brood (inset photo) to entice the queen into a hive placed on the ground while the colony was relocated.

The bees are now settled in their new home with Robin Chandeler, pictured demonstrating his skill to Keith Barton.
