Tory councillors win £6.5m to ease traffic bottleneck



LONG OVERDUE improvements to ease traffic flows at the station roundabout are well under way.

Work on the A27 between Bishopsfield Road and the roundabout started on May 16, which will hopefully ease tailbacks towards Portchester.

The £6.5m scheme aims to reduce congestion and increase capacity at the junctions with Western Way, West Street, Gudge Heath Lane and Redlands Lane.

Portchester East **Conservative** Councillor Geoff Fazackarley said: "Without doubt the congestion at the Fareham Station roundabout causes traffic to queue in the afternoons all the way back to junction 11 of the M27.

"This leads to drivers dropping down from the Delme overpass to the roundabout below, only to re-join at the Bath Lane end.

"It is this which blocks the Delme Roundabout and causes the huge queues from Portchester so anything that will re-



lieve that is to be welcomed."

The highway will be widened to improve traffic flow, there will be wider footpaths and upgrades to the train station with better access to further improve transport infrastructure.

The roundabout part of the project aims to achieve a more balanced traffic flow, new pedestrian access from West Street to the station including modifications to the subway, a new bus lane and bus stop.

There will be an extra lane for westbound traffic while retaining the right-hand turn into Gudge Heath Lane.

It is estimated the work will take just over a year and inevitably there will be frustrating delays, but councillors ask residents and drivers to be patient.

The work is funded by Hampshire County Council secured by your local **Conservative** Councillors and forms part of wider improvements planned at junctions 9 and 10 of the M27 and the proposed Stubbington by-pass.

Stripping bureaucrats' powers could boost local economy and enterprise

A deal has been offered to councils in South Hampshire, including Fareham, which would provide:

- •Extra to funding already announced for Local Enterprise Partnership and 8 local councils; will meet estimated

£2bn costs for infrastructure in South Hampshire

- •Keeping local business rates (£400m); leaving current system of government funding for local councils
- •Powers over statutory plans for housing and infrastructure, ability to designate greenbelt
- •Increase productivity, create more and better jobs by supporting business growth
- •Control adult education and training budget, focusing on skills so people

get jobs and businesses prosper

- •Deliver much-needed new homes, particularly affordable homes for local people.
- •Control of dedicated transport budget, franchised bus services and local authority roads

Once in place, we hope to demonstrate our successes and negotiate for further powers for Solent region.

It does NOT mean reorganising or scrapping borough councils and creating a unitary council covering Hampshire as proposed by HCC.

Dangerous parking

A near collision between a car and a child led to complaints from Cornaway Lane residents.

Councillor Geoff Fazackarley and InTouch team leader Trevor Alford met the residents who said the problem lay with parked cars either straddling the pathway or partially blocking private accesses, resulting in blind spots for pedestrians and

Geoff will pursue the issue with the Borough Council.

No smoking

Following residents' comments, all bus shelters in the town will carry stickers requesting the public not to smoke while waiting.

Poor response

A survey about providing another play area in the Condor Avenue open space got a poor response.

Only 17 households bothered to reply to 400 hand-delivered letters, and most opposed the suggestion.

There are 43 children's play areas across the Borough, but only one in this part of Portchester.

Apart from the money, the Council has difficulty identifying suitable locations and Condor Avenue was suggested for a small play area.

Most of those who responded were concerned about noise, anti-social behaviour and possible traffic and parking issues.

Popular Parkrun sets the pace in Portchester

THE FIRST Parkrun in the Borough was held in Portchester and attracted scores of people.

Parkrun UK operates as a nonprofit organisation, staging a series of free, weekly 5km timed runs in open spaces around the UK.

Parkruns are open to all abilities and are safe and easy to take part in and there are currently over 340 in the country.

The focus is on recreational run-

ning, bringing people together and helping achieve a healthy lifestyle. Events take place every Saturday around 9am.

The route of the Fareham Parkrun is the easy-access coastal path around Cams Hall Estate and golf club, with the run starting and finishing at the Cams Mill pub.

Fareham Council provided community funding of £3,000 to help set up this project in Portchester.



Mayor's charities

Fareham's new Mayor, Councillor Connie Hockley, will support two charity funds.

Wessex Haven, the national charity that provides support and therapies for breast cancer sufferers, opened its regional centre in The Square. Titchfield last October.

The Mayor said: "Anyone affected by breast cancer is welcome, including free counselling for family and close friends."

Her other good cause is Y-Services, a local charity aimed to support and develop quality youth work to meet needs of local children.

Strategy to protect coast for next 100 years



SEA DEFENCE measures costing £47m to protect the East Solent coastline have been approved.

Fareham and Gosport Coastal Strategy aims to reduce risk of flooding and erosion to over 2,800 properties over the next 100 years.

But the plan outlining measures to prevent over £700 million of damages is dependent on the funding being found and is not imminent.

However, Portchester East Councillor Geoff Fazackarley says there is money for the Portchester to Paulsgove section from Hospital Lane and along the A27 shoreline as Portsmouth City Council made it a condition in granting a development application by Trafalgar Wharf.

But a large proportion of the money needed to deliver the strategy, covering the coast from the River Hamble to Portchester, will have to come from sources other than traditional government funding.

The strategy was adopted by Gosport and Fareham Borough Councils in spring 2015 and approved by the Environment Agency in April 2016.

Councillor Keith Evans, Partnership Joint Board member and Fareham Executive member for Strate-

gic Planning and Environment said:

"The development of this strategy for the Fareham shoreline has improved our understanding of coastal flood and erosion risk locally. By being part of a group of co-operating local authorities. Fareham has gained access to expertise and government grants.

"We now have to think creatively about how we secure contributions and funding to ensure that the strategy's recommendations are delivered."

Portchester shopping centre regeneration work is progressing



DETAILED feasibility work to strengthen Portchester District Centre should be completed by late summer.

Portchester Member Working Group is leading work towards the vision for its future.

It wants to encourage a range of shops and leisure facilities to meet the needs of a modern community, and to foster an evening economy.

Carefully planned housing will be needed to facilitate improvements to the centre and attract investment and new jobs.

As part of the regeneration initiative, there is the potential to make improvements to the pedestrian areas in the centre (subject to external funding), which should help make the area more attractive to potential inves-

Before starting, the Working Group needed to understand how the District Centre is being used at present.

First consideration was car parking as it is important to ensure there will be enough for the retail outlets now and in the future.

The Council commissioned Alpha Parking to carry out a survey to identify patterns of those using the public car parks.

The second task was speaking to owners of the main sites and properties to understand their ideas on improving the centre. Work is progressing on the concept stage of regeneration options after which the Council will talk to the main site owners about the production of more detailed op-

Replying to the debate, Security Minister John Hayes congratulated me on the role I played in both committees.

He said: "The threat she described so vividly is, as she said, worldwide and of a kind that would allow us to do nothing other than take the necessary steps to counter it in the defence of our freedoms."
