THE DREAM COMES TRUE

HOLLY HILL Leisure Centre is on course for its public opening in September.

Everyone Active, who will operate the £9.5m centre, will start fitting out at the beginning of August.

A Portacabin has been set up on site to deal with membership inquiries and job opportunities.

Two new junior football pitches will be provided next to the centre, plus a new children's play area and a multi-use games area once building is complete.

This will cater for a range of ages and abilities, providing space for sports such as football, basketball and netball.

Part of the Coldeast Park site which is open to the public has a variety of habitats including a pond, woodlands, meadows and orchard which had been neglected for years.

The Council asked one of our rangers, Helen Sosnowski (pictured) and her team of volunteers, to clear the site.

Much of the orchard was an impenetrable jungle of brambles and ivy, but once clear the

trees had their first prune for years and blossomed in May. Urgent work was also needed on the unkempt pond and overgrown path on one side of it; so in early autumn 2014 the path was widened and overhanging trees were cleared.

However, the pond needed dredging and in winter 2015 it was pumped out, cleaned and re-filled by a natural spring feed. All the wild life and fish have returned.

This winter, volunteers were hard at work clearing other parts of the site, especially the overgrown meadow which was once used to house pigs!

Warsash Councillor Trevor Cartwright said: "Helen and her team of volunteers have our full admiration for all their hard work and I congratulate them on their brilliant achievement to date.

"Holly Hill Leisure Centre has been a goal that we have shared for many years. It takes a long time to acquire the land and save the necessary £9m, but the people of Fareham's Western Wards will be delighted with what we have been able to create."



Stripping bureaucrats' powers could boost local economy and enterprise

THE GOVERNMENT proposes certain powers wielded by Whitehall bureaucrats can be decided by local council leaders working with an elected mayor.

A deal has been offered to councils in South Hampshire, including Fareham, which would provide:

- •Annual £30m funding for 30 years to invest in economic growth and housing including power to borrow
- •Extra to funding already announced for Local Enterprise Partnership and 8 local councils; will meet estimated

£2bn costs for infrastructure in South Hampshire

- •Keeping local business rates (£400m); leaving current system of government funding for local councils
- •Powers over statutory plans for housing and infrastructure, ability to designate greenbelt
- •Increase productivity, create more and better jobs by supporting business growth
- •Control adult education and training budget, focusing on skills so people

get jobs and businesses prosper

- •Deliver much-needed new homes, particularly affordable homes for local people.
- •Control of dedicated transport budget, franchised bus services and local authority roads

Once in place, we hope to demonstrate our successes and negotiate for further powers for Solent region.

It does NOT mean reorganising or scrapping borough councils and creating a unitary council covering Hampshire as proposed by HCC.

The hospital has operated office hours only 5 days a week since it opened 5 years ago.

Fareham MP Suella Fernandes set up a task force comprising representatives from local NHS organisations and Friends of Fareham Community Hospital.

She persuaded Health Minister Jeremy Hunt to visit the hospital in January when he was told about its problems.

The Minister asked the task force to identify specific proposals to recify the confused management.

Dealing with picnic litter bugs

BIN emptyings will be doubled during the summer at The Strawberry Fields where picnickers have been leaving litter.

Councillor Mike Ford, one of whose jobs is to make sure there are enough bins and to monitor the frequency of emptying, said: "I have reviewed the situa-

tion with officers and the position will be helped by them having implemented their summer regime which raises the emptying of bins on these fields from 3 times a week in winter and spring to 6 times a

week until autumn."

Overflowing bins are still a problem. The fields have 100-litre bins, but anything larger would be a mini-skip on wheels, which would be unsightly and prone to vandalism.

"I and the Council's Streetscene team will monitor the situation and assess whether more bins are needed."

National Grid submits

application for mega

Since then, Fareham Council has received an outline planning application from National Grid for the massive multi-million pound building which can exchange 1,000 megawatts of power with France via a submarine cable.

Included in the application is the final link to the National Grid via cabling to Chilling and public open space.

Councillor Trevor Cartwright said an environmental impact was also included, covering key issues such as the visual appearance, noise, electric and magnetic fields and impact on aircraft and airfield operations.

As part of the public consultation, just over 4,800 letters were sent out, with press notices, social media and site notices.

Opportunity to comment closed on June 30 and the application is likely to be decided by the Planning Committee in September. Councillor Cartwright said some local residents and the Lee-on-the-Solent Gosport

councillors opposed the application and felt that Chilling was a better proposal.

He added: "This was previously considered by National Grid, which would be totally unacceptable, and was refused by Hampshire County Council."

Council cash grants will give Victory Hall a new lease of life



IT'S FULL steam ahead for the Victory Hall after funding was allocated to make vital repairs that will give it a new lease of life.

Councillor Mike Ford said the hall needed £200,000

for maintenance and an application was made to rewrite our constitution (the hall is a registered char-Hampshire County Council last year for cash from its community buildings capital fund.

Mike said: "I'm delighted to report that HCC has granted the full £148,000 we applied for.

"An application has gone to Fareham Borough Council for £40,000 under its matched community fund and the hall management will put £10,000 from reserves into the pot.

"This is excellent news and will secure the future of the hall and significantly improve its insulation and

Built in 1975 with a lifespan of 30 years, Victory Hall is well past its 'sell-by' date.

Main problems centre on its mostly flat roof and the grants should give it at least another 25 years as the hub of the Warsash community.

'Eat out, eat well' scheme

A NEW scheme has been launched in Fareham and Gosport to reward food businesses for providing their customers with healthier eating choices.

The 'Eat Out, Eat Well' scheme aims to help food businesses make small changes to the menu, such as reducing the fat, sugar and salt levels of dishes, and offering other healthy options.

This will mean consumers can opt for healthier choices when buying take-aways or eating out.

Catering businesses in Fareham and Gosport with a food hygiene rating of at least 3 can sign up to the scheme.

They would then be rewarded with a Bronze, Silver or Gold award which they could display.

Council's efficiency rewarded

FAREHAM's Conservative-run Council picked up a Bronze at the prestigious Improvement and Efficiency Awards event in London.

Councillor Trevor Cartwright, who attended, said Fareham was nominated because it had completely remodelled how services are assessed while improving customer experience – already generating £500,000 annual savings.

He said: "Winning this award celebrates the hard work and effort put in the help to provide excellent services."

to scheme online, making it more challenging to keep track of them and gather the vital evidence to secure a prosecution or thwart plots.

The Commons passed the landmark Investigatory Powers Bill to regulate the interception powers used by our intelligence, security and law enforcement services.

I have taken a close interest in this issue and served on the joint committee of MPs and Lords that studied the draft Bill, and on the subsequent Commons committee that looked at current proposals.

Replying to the debate, Security Minister John Hayes congratulated me on the role I played in both committees.

He said: "The threat she described so vividly is, as she said, worldwide and of a kind that would allow us to do nothing other than take the necessary steps to counter it in the defence of our freedoms."
