Just a 1p a day rise as Tories set austerity-defying budget

CONSERVATIVES have agreed yet another austeritydefying budget for Fareham.

Despite losing its entire Revenue Support Grant from government, the Borough share of council tax will rise by just 1p a day for the average home.

The Council spends £46m delivering services, but the amount raised in council tax accounts for only 14% of that sum, so we have to raise the rest by investing YOUR money wisely.

For example, over £26m has been invested in the last 3 years in commercial property, mainly in Fareham Borough, producing an income of nearly £2m a year.

Without this income your council tax would have to be increased by nearly 30%.

The resulting budget sees the Council's services remain intact and a district council tax which remains almost the lowest in the country.

Car parking charges are frozen for the 7th year and continue to apply only in the town centre, and free in the evenings and Sundays in the long-stay car parks.

Council Leader Seán Woodward said: "Times are incredibly hard in the public sector, but we have been able to preserve all the services which our residents value

while respecting that many, particularly those on fixed incomes, would find even modest increases in our charges difficult to bear."

Same-day GP service success

The Fareham Primary Care Service sameday GP access at Fareham Community Hospital reports that nearly 1,000 patients were seen within the first 5 weeks of its inception.

Currently, 4 GP practices are providing this service and it is expected that this scheme will include other practices in Fareham in the coming year.

THE NEXT stage of Abshot Community Centre's refurbishment programme is progressing well.

Fareham Borough Council has been working to upgrade the toilet facilities and to date the disabled and ladies' toilets have been modernised to a high standard. Contractors are due to complete the work on the men's toilets.

Councillor Sarah Pankhurst (pictured with ACA Chairman Anna Hewitt) says: "I am very pleased to see the transformation of the centre which gives it modern facilities and upgrade the building in general.

"Following on from the new roof replacement, the centre's entrance doors were upgraded to electric giving disabled visitors ease of access. The toilet upgrade is the next stage."

Anna said: "It has been a long awaited upgrade and

we are grateful for Sarah's and FBC's support. It is certainly benefiting all users here."

Road adoptions go-ahead

ADOPTION of two roads in Titchfield Common can now proceed.

Councillor Sarah Pankhurst said the 'right to discharge' agreement had been completed so the developer and the County Council could go ahead with adoption of roads at the Highwoods part of Tanners Gate.

An inspection should have been done by the time we went to print and any defects rectified.

Sarah Pankhurst, who's been pushing to get it completed after storm water flooding problems were fixed, said:

"As yet, I am not aware of the road adoption to the north part of the estate. I shall keep residents updated."

FAREHAM has 43 Play Areas with over 350 items of equipment, suitable for various ages and abilities.

It is safe, fun, challenging and inclusive as well as being accessible Councillor Connie Hockley, chairman of the Leisure and Community Policy Development and Review Panel, says: "There has been a rolling programme to improve and update many of the sites that were identified as being in the greatest need.

"In the last 3 years, 14 play areas have been refurbished, 22 have had a 'mini makeover' and a new one has been installed at Holly Hill.

"Plans are being drawn up to improve further sites over the next 5 years and I am pleased to report that Barry's Meadow is on the list to be updated in 2019/20.

"We can also look forward to the Titchfield Country Park play area being installed."

Flats noise vibration misery

have so far been unresponsive to calls to deal with the problem.

And ward Councillor Sarah Pankhurst is asking whether residents are being sold short by minimum standards in building regulations.

Residents Mr Kevin Towler and Miss Hannah Harris (pictured) contacted her because they felt 'totally alienated' due to lack of support from the landlords who failed to recognise that neighbours' washing machines cause vibration throughout the ground, first and second floor flats.

Even when neighbours walk around, their footsteps echo through the ceiling.

"Mr Towler and Miss Harris showed me a recording where their kitchen sink tap was vibrating loudly and I was shocked that even smoke detectors were de-

They claim landlords, Vivid Housing Association, tatching from the ceilings following the regular and sustained vibration through metal connectors in between the floor levels.

> "The issue seems to be connected to a Building Regulation Minimum Standard and I have also been made aware of similar noise pollution problems in Bedford Drive."

> Mr Towler and Miss Harris are in discussion with Vivid Housing Association to try to find a solution, but minimum standards and private agents handling building regulation sign-off means that Fareham Borough Council cannot enforce standards.

> Sarah Pankhurst added: "The system is allowing developers to profit from poorly designed and built properties leading to misery, stress and strain.

"I am awaiting an update from Vivid Homes and will inform residents as soon as possible."

Fareham traffic pollution brings Environment Minister to town

POOR AIR quality caused by traffic pollution in several parts of Fareham led to a Government minister visiting to see what action the Council is taking.

The Council is taking it seriously and, with ANPR cameras monitoring 27 sites across the Borough, is doing its best to improve the situation.

There will be a new air quality working group chaired by Warsash Councillor Trevor Cartwright, which will speed up the process of bidding for Government grants.

A survey will be carried out to see the nature of traffic using these roads and the information will be part of our new plan that must be submitted to the Government by the end of March this year.

The Government recently published a new Air Quality Plan, looking at ways of reducing unacceptable levels of nitrogen dioxide vehicle emissions.

The report highlighted hotspots in Fareham, including the A27 near the Delme roundabout down to Quay Street roundabout, part of Gosport Road, and along the A27 to the Station roundabout.

It sparked a recent visit to Fareham by Environment

Minister Dr Thérèse Coffey to discuss the Council's plans to tackle the problem.

She said: "Air pollution has improved significantly since 2010 but we recognise there is more to do which is why we have put in place a £3.5 billion plan to improve air quality and reduce harmful emis-

sions.

"I am delighted to see Fareham taking this seriously and look forward to seeing firm plans for action as they develop further."

Locks Heath Councillors Susan Bayford and Keith Evans agreed reducing air pollution was top priority, particularly

Sea defences take another battering



THE £1m Borough Council project to maintain and improve the sea wall at Hill Head was completed in December.

But another problem has now arisen further east below Hill Head Road.

There has been a dramatic fall in beach levels, resulting in the uncovering of old groyne posts and concrete foundations.

Access along the beach at high tide is now almost impossible.

Investigations are continuing with councillors liaising with residents and the authorities concerned.

In the earlier works, 4,000 tons of shingle were used to renourish the beach to protect it from wave damage and extensive maintenance was carried out on the groynes.

A rail was also installed along the renewed promenade wall to make it safer.

Further work has been carried out on the groynes east of Giblet Ore with local residents working in collaboration with the Council.
