IT READS like a Laurel and Hardy farce, but for Fareham planners the mess they have been gotten into by the Government is no laughing matter.

In less than a year, yet more green fields have come under threat as Whitehall demands the Borough Council finds space for up to

And these come on top of the 2,300 houses we have already been forced to add to the new Draft Plan 2011-2036.

"What an awful Government-inspired mess this has been," said Executive Member for Planning and Development Councillor Keith Evans.

To meet the original target of 2,300, the Council proposed having as much brownfield development as possible, plus large new greenfield sites in Warsash, Portchester, Titchfield Common and South Fareham, which sparked furious protests from residents.

The dust hadn't settled before Whitehall moved the goal posts again with a new formula to calculate housing need, a stronger obligation to take up unmet housing need from nearby councils and severe penalties for non-planning approval or non-delivery.

The mess became a mire and led to the Council having to sus-

Keith Evans led fierce Council opposition to the changes, but intensive lobbying of Housing Minister Kit Malthouse and senior civil servants by the Council Leader and Fareham and Gosport MPs fell on deaf ears.

He stated: "Government ignored our objections and is proceeding with the new mechanisms – although it conceded on one point and will introduce the measuring against new numbers effectively from 2020 rather than being backdated.

"We are working through the numbers, but it looks certain to be in the range of 1,800 to 2,500 more houses above the original additional 2,300 - an enormous increase and one which will have to be met in the main from further new greenfield sites."

Fortunately, the suspended Draft Plan remains valid while the Council confirms the extra numbers and evaluates all the remaining green space in Fareham.

Residents are being consulted on site options which will be merged into the current Draft Plan before a new plan is issued for public comment in the autumn/winter 2019.

Keith Evans added: "Fortunately, we have a good knowledgeable team of planning officers who are helping to minimise delays and the additional costs."

Fareham Leisure Centre, which is managed by Everyone Active on behalf of FBC, has been recognised for its outstanding services following a thorough assessment by Sport England's leading national quality scheme, Quest.

It is the first leisure centre nationally to gain four consecutive outstanding judgements.

Weed spraying under way

The County Council was scheduled to start weed spraying in Fareham from the beginning of May.

Contractors will work west to east through the Borough to complete the job by the end of the month.

This is much earlier than the last few years and should be more effective.

Help for homeless

The Government has announced a Flexible Homelessness Support Grant, and local charity Two Saints will benefit by £40,000, allowing them to extend outreach worker hours and enable more homeless people to get help.

New dog fouling law

A clamp-down on dirty dog owners came into force on April 1.

The Council's new Public Spaces Protection Order aims to encourage dog owners to be more responsible.

It allows the Council to continue to tackle dog fouling and request dogs be put on leads if causing a public nuisance. They must be on leads in sensitive places such as cemeteries and are excluded from certain places such as play areas.

The PSPO also limits the number of dogs a person can walk at any one time to four.

Jobs forecast

A famous British aero company is investing heavily in Fareham.

Percival Aviation's new site in Cartwright Drive, Segensworth will create jobs and strengthen the Fareham economy.

The company, established in the region for over 40 years, expects to create around 30 new jobs over the next 5 years.

Brickworks wins transport award

BURSLEDON Brickworks has won the first Institute of Transport Administration award.

It was presented by IOTA national chairman John Egan, who is pictured with Fareham Mayor Susan Bayford and Sarisbury Councillor Seán Woodward.

It recognises work done at the brickworks by Hampshire Narrow Gauge Railway Trust, South Hampshire Historic Steam &

Engineering Society and Southampton and District Transport Heritage Trust.

'Big Belly' digests tons of waste

TWO NEW smart bins have been installed in the Borough as part of a trial to help reduce the amount of

The bins, nicknamed the 'Big Belly', replaced another brand of solar bins at Holly Hill play area and Passage Lane car park in Warsash.

Solar compaction technology boosts capacity to 808 litres and compacts the litter several

times a day, so more can be disposed of and fewer collections are needed.

'Big Belly' is currently used by more than 80 councils and is operated by a handle or by using a foot pedal. A sensor emails the council office when it's full, so the bin can be emptied.

The trial lasts until August 2019 and results will be monitored.

Many residents are worried about social care for their elderly and vulnerable relatives.

The Government is committed to improving social care. £1.8 billion is allocated for 2019-20 through the improved Better Care Fund, ie a 23% increase on last year.

For Hampshire, an extra £4.7m has been allocated for winter pressures, and in Fareham, I have visited excellent residential care homes like Gracewell, Hamble Heights and Abbeyfield where residents are brilliantly cared for.

Despite the good work, there are many people who find the Continuing Health Care system slow,



bureaucratic and unfair. John White. from Fareham, (pictured) came to see me about caring for his sister-in-law who was suffering

disease.

Funding applications were rejected by West Hampshire CCG and the appeals process was delayed so that funding was only granted after 6 years - too late for his sister-in-law who had sadly passed away.

THEIR sacrifice in two World Wars will live for ever, but the names of those who gave their lives are fading away on Sarisbury's war memorial.

Some on the 1914-18 side of the memorial are barely recognisable, but help is at hand in the first stage of restoration.

When the matter was drawn to Fareham cemeteries officer Christine Callaby's attention, she managed

to record all the names by searching the Imperial War

Museum's web site

She said:"I was able to reconcile all the names on this war memorial and establish the missing ones by process of elimination and remains of the eroded inscrip-

She also discovered the

picture of the memorial taken on November 11, 1921 when it was dedicated.

She added:"The next stage is to investigate if we can find a specialised contractor to restore the names.

"I will do my best to do so as soon as I can."
