It will also bring both schools together into one Primary School.

£800,000 secured to tackle local deprivation

Following the successful application for funding from the Government's Prosperity Fund, £800,000 has been allocated to deliver improved community facilities in two areas in Fareham.

The most significant project in this plan is the creation of a community-led Masterplan for the Henry Cort Drive area in Fareham North West. This site could provide up to 55 much needed affordable homes alongside enhanced community buildings and sports provision.

Experts in community-led planning will be appointed and it is anticipated that engagement with local residents, partners and Ward Councillors will begin in the summer.

New Telegraph Poles

New telegraph poles have been installed in Fareham NW under 'Permitted Development' license issued by Hampshire County Council.

As it is classed as 'Permitted Development' the

companies erecting these poles do not require to apply for individual planning permission from Fareham Borough Council or undertake a period of consultation.

Councillor Fred Birkett commented: "A high number of these pole installations have already been carried out, and although I will continue to push for greater consultations with affected residents in the future, it would appear there is little that can be done to stop or even alter this tranche of work.
