
Many people have been angered and disgusted by the recent behaviour of Nick Gregory as Councillor for Fareham South.

- Air-ground lighting at Solent Airport to attract and keep more aviation tenants.
- A £1 million children's playground refurbishment programme across Fareham.
- Over £3 million of disabled adaptation grants to help people make adaptations to their homes.
- A £400,000 programme of works to improve community centres.

Depression in our children

Councillor Stephen Ingram writes:

I feel compelled to share this important information with the residents of Fareham, especially those who are parents like myself. As adults, we understand that our most important responsibility is our children. However, over the past two years, their lives have been drastically altered due to circumstances beyond their control.

Recently, many Fareham South residents have contacted me, seeking advice on how to deal with the changes in their children's lives. To better understand the problem, I approached Austen Pearl, who runs a local fostering agency called Tenia Care. With over 40 years of experience in childcare, Austen is one of the most qualified individuals to advise on this subject. Austen's insight into the situation was invaluable, and he explained that the past two years have had a negative impact on our children.

Austen's advice was straightforward: as parents, we need to be vigilant and notice any changes in our children's behaviour. He emphasised the importance of recognising symptoms of depression in children, which can be challenging to identify. For example, in adolescents, sulkiness, irritability, antisocial behaviour, negativity, and withdrawal may be signs of depression. Meanwhile, in younger children, a morbid preoccupation with death and dying or extreme fear of being separated from parents and friends may indicate depression.

One of the biggest issues, according to Austen, is that many parents are not trained to recognise the signs that their child may be depressed.

Therefore, it's crucial that we learn to observe and understand our children's behaviour to identify potential problems and take appropriate action.

As parents, we need to prioritise our children's mental health and do everything we can to support them during these challenging times.

Getting treatment for your child

It's crucial to take action and not wait for the symptoms of depression to go away on their own. Depression can have a severe impact on a child's life if left untreated. If you notice the warning signs of depression, it's essential to seek professional help.

Make an appointment with your family physician for a depression screening. Be prepared to provide specific information about your child's symptoms, how long they've been present, how much they're affecting their daily life, and any patterns you've noticed.

Remember, seeking help is a sign of strength, and there is no shame in reaching out for help when you need it.

Success! £800,000 for improved local facilities

Fareham Borough Council has announced that it has been awarded £1 million from the Government's Shared Prosperity Fund.

Following this successful application for funding, the Council has allocated £800,000 to deliver improved community facilities in two areas in Fareham that experience comparatively higher levels of deprivation.

The second community focused project is the provision of a greatly enhanced recreational and play facilities at Crossfell Walk in Fareham South.

The allocation of these funds has been eagerly awaited for some time, and will be welcomed by local resident Lorraine Driver. Lorraine has campaigned for the play area to be improved for some time and greeted the news enthusiastically commenting: "Thank you so much Councillor Stephen Ingram for your help and support on this journey".



The next stage of the project is to agree on the design for the new play area and choose the play equipment that will be incorporated.

The UK Shared Prosperity Fund is a central pillar of the UK government's Levelling Up agenda and provides £2.6 billion of funding for local investment. The Fund aims to improve pride in place and increase life chances across the UK investing in communities and supporting local business.
