It's great to see that it is already well-used by dog walkers.





With a budget of over £50 million per year, the council tax raised by Fareham Council is less than £8 million, which means that 84% of the Council's expenditure is covered by fees, charges and commercial property rents.

Fareham Council's impressive financial management is evident in its ability to deliver essential services and still allocate funds for ambitious capital projects.

Our local Conservative Councillor Harry Davis is getting on with the job and fulfilling his election pledges to keep Fareham and Portchester's Council Tax low.

So, what does £3 a week get us in Fareham?

Despite the tight costs of service delivery, Fareham Borough Council has an impressive capital programme of £62 million over the next five years, including...

- £25 million for building new council houses and upgrading existing stock.
- Plans to demolish the 50-year-old Osborn Road multi-storey car park and replace it with a modern surface car park, electric car charging points and solar panels to generate power.
- Air-ground lighting at Solent Airport to attract and keep more aviation tenants.
- A £1 million children's playground refurbishment programme across Fareham.
- Over £3 million of disabled adaptation grants to help people make adaptations to their homes.
- A £400,000 programme of works to improve community centres.

'Flying High!' - Faraday Business Park at Solent Airport @Daedalus is the largest employment site in the Borough, and it now contributes significantly to the cost of running the council's services - reducing YOUR tax bill!

Our area has secured £487,500 to assess and develop long-term coastal management solutions at Fareham Quay, as well as between Alton Grove to Cador Drive.


The project team will appraise, develop and cost options for coastal management, investigate future funding sources for delivering the schemes and prepare outline designs for each location.

- West Street & Cornaway Lane Subways: Trip hazards in the subways caused by loose paving and crumbling stone have now been repaired.
- Fly-tipping: Harry organised the removal of various fly-tipping incidents off Castle Street, Carlton Road, Leith Avenue, West Street and Norgett Way.
- Portchester Library: Has been redecorated with new carpets amd new soft furnishings. Just in time for the school holidays!
- Wicor Skate Park: To receive a £100,000 refurbishment and upgrade.
- Portchester Precinct Car Park: To remain free to support local shops.
- Potholes: If there are any potholes that you know of in the local area, please tell Harry and he'll keep chasing them up to get them sorted.



Greener recycling for Portchester!

The UK government recently passed the "Environment Bill" which sets new waste collection and recycling targets.

As part of the national initiative, Fareham Borough Council is taking steps to meet these targets, including preparing to implement a Deposit Return Scheme (DRS) over the next two years.

The DRS will allow people to recycle aluminium cans and plastic drinks bottles To reduce waste in the meantime, the at shops using reverse vending machines Council encourages residents to reuse that convert waste into money.

The Council also aims to increase its recycling rate from 33% to 65% by introducing separate food waste collections, which will be converted into energy using Anaerobic Digestion (AD).

This new service is set to be introduced in 2025, along with changes to add glass collection to recycling bins and a separate paper and card collection.
