Huge £30m investment to regenerate the fareham **Town Centre!**

Fareham Borough Council is taking another big step forward in centre has much to its plans to breathe new life into Fareham Town Centre through a comprehensive programme of investment and regeneration.

The new community, arts and entertainment venue, Fareham Live, with a total of around 1,000 seats, is already set to become a hugely important asset for the town with new modern parking alongside, and the Council is now considering the acquisition of a series of other assets, one of which is Fareham Shopping Centre.

Town centres across the country have been affected by the collapse of the department store sector, shifts in customers' shopping habits, and many high street brands either moving online or disappearing altogether.



While Fareham town offer residents and visitors, with many national outlets and independent traders along with food and entertainment, it has been affected by national trends.

The Council wants to ensure that the town centre responds effectively and takes the opportunity to re-invent itself by offering a wide range of uses alongside vibrant and wellconnected public spaces in order to ensure its success in the long term.

The Council has recently decided to take the bold step of setting aside over £30m of funding to support a significant regeneration programme.

Major investments are currently being made with the development of Fareham Live and the forthcoming demolition of the decaying Osborn Road multi-storey car park in favour of a new surface car park. The Council is now in active discussions with the owners regarding the possible acquisition of a series of town centre properties including Fareham Shopping Centre.

Work will be undertaken over the coming months to create a draft Regeneration Framework for public consultation and partner engagement.

Councillor Seán Woodward, Executive Leader of the Council. said: "We are committed to the longterm regeneration of Fareham town centre and have been making plans over several years for how this may be achieved. People now look to town centres to provide a broader mix of leisure and social activities, as well as retail outlets offering products and services that are not so available online, together with opportunities for town centre living.

"We need to acknowledge that the private sector alone will not bring forward the regeneration of Fareham town centre. The Council will be leading on harnessing the resources of both the public and private sector to help deliver effective regeneration over the coming years.

"This injection of over £30m of funding is just the start of ensuring that the town centre delivers what the residents of Fareham need for the future. Looking ahead we will be taking the important step of seeking early views from all parts of the local community on the regeneration opportunities that lie ahead."

£7.5 million for road improvements

Hampshire County Council has committed a further £7.5 million a-year to fix 1000s more potholes.

This investment boost recognises the importance of good roads for Hampshire residents' quality of life and for the local economy.

This additional money will enable road teams to fix potholes and other defects faster, including by infilling whole stretches of road, allowing us to address not just the initial reported pothole, but other problems nearby on the same road, on the same visit.

Councillor Susan Walker reports: "In the time taken to undertake one permanent patch repair, between 4 and 7 infill repairs can be completed.

"So while infill repairs might be seen as a temporary solution, they enable the County Council to tackle immediate safety risks promptly with minimum traffic disruption.

"Permanent repairs will be made on a return visit."

Fareham backs Citizens Advice

Fareham Council backs Citizens' Advice Fareham with a new 3-year deal, maintaining free, impartial support for residents. Last year, they aided 2,801 people on 8,982 matters, a notable rise from 1,727 the previous year.

The advisors handle weekly issues such as finances, housing, and charitable aid. They also made 80 home visits in 2022. To meet growing demand, the council increased the annual deal by £15,000, reaching £135,000 for 3 years. Notably, the outreach program returns to Portchester Library, after a long break due to COVID-19.

Susan Walker, in her capacity as Executive Member of Leisure and Community, said:

""Post-Covid and due to the Cost of Living crisis, Citizens Advice demand surged. This extra funding ensures prompt access to advisers for Fareham residents, addressing their needs without delay. Citizens Advice excels, and I'm thrilled to extend this SLA for three more years."
