Fareham Community Hospital: New Renal Unit

I was delighted to join the official opening of the new Dialysis Unit at Fareham Community Hospital. Thank you to the team at QA who have worked to open this new multi-million pound health care facility, supported by my Taskforce which I have chaired for several years.

The new 25 bed renal dialysis unit will provide life saving treatment to 150 patients a week, helping with chronic kidney disease who would otherwise have to travel make miles for intravenous iron infusions, outpatient care and dialysis. We estimate that this new service will save over 300,000 miles of travel and make treatment more available to thousands of patients.

This is the latest in improvements that we have seen in recent years at Fareham Community Hospital. My Taskforce has been working with health partners to facilitate greater usage of this fantastic Hospital and I'm glad that we've seen a new Chemotherapy unit, Vaccination centre and Same Day Access to a GP at FCH over the last few years.

Demolition of Assheton Court!

Fareham Borough Council has announced that demolition work has now begun on its Assheton Court site in Portchester.

Once completed, the new Assheton Court will provide 60 sheltered housing apartments for the over 55s, with significant improvement in terms of facilities, accessibility, quality of build and layout.

The Council is taking a 'greener' approach wherever possible to ensure new homes and buildings are energy efficient, such as installing solar panels and air source heat pumps, and Assheton Court will be no exception.

Success! Portsview Avenue is to be resurfaced

Following a long campaign, our local Councillors Nick & Sue Walker are delighted to report that they have persuaded the Highway's Authority to resurface Portsview Avenue.

Nick & Sue worked closely with our other Conservative Councillor Harry Davis to survey local residents and invited Hampshire's Cabinet Member for Highways down to Portchester to see the problem.

Thanks to Nick & Sue, working for our community, Portsview Avenue is due to be fully resurfaced in March next year, for the first time in decades!
