Caroline Dinenage writes:

The-long awaited first Labour Government Budget has finally been delivered. Following early announcements about cutting Winter Fuel Payments for pensioners and the first ever Education Tax on independent schools, many were worried about how painful it would be. My inbox over recent weeks has been dominated by some of the 15,000 pensioners across this constituency who will lose their Winter Fuel Payment, a policy which Age UK predict will likely cost more than it saves. As well as the parents of children with learning difficulties or neurodiversity, who struggled in mainstream school, sometimes dropping out altogether, who are now being priced out of the independent sector.

In most cases the impact of these changes falls not on wealthy people but those just about managing and doing their best. And what's worse, these decisions were made without the Government publishing full impact assessments to know for sure. Sadly the Government have now compounded this early distress with a Budget which runs roughshod over their pre-election promises to be fiscally prudent and not to put up taxes on working people. It's the biggest tax-raising Budget ever, around £40 Billion in extra taxes, an average £2000 increase on every working household. The changes to employer National Insurance Contributions will massively impact all but the smallest businesses and inevitably be passed to workers in the form of higher costs, lower wages and up to 50,000 fewer jobs.

The Government will perform a range of mental gymnastics to justify the biggest tax rising Budget in history.

But what they have delivered will simply hit people's pockets with little to stimulate growth.

Sadly inflation and interest rates are likely to rise too, impacting mortgage repayments.

I'm particularly concerned for local businesses, particularly sectors like childcare and care homes in Stubbington and Hill Head, who employ a lot of people on lower wages.



They will be smacked with a double whammy of minimum wage increases and Employer National Insurance Contributions. These additional costs will no doubt be passed on to working families, older people and local authorities.

Hiding behind a debunked Budget black hole to excuse high tax, high borrowing and high spending which is not predicted to deliver the growth we need.

Fiddling the fiscal rules and saddling our children and grandchildren with a future of debt.

A Budget of broken promises. No wonder Keir Starmer's post election popularity has plummeted faster than any other new PM in modern history.

After much anticipation, the brand new Fareham Live was officially opened with a red carpet Gala Evening, featuring a sold-out performance of Richard O'Brien's Rocky Horror Show, starring Jason Donovan. The evening was an outstanding success, with the audience enthusiastically joining in the singing and dancing. Trafalgar Theatres made Fareham proud by organising a VIP-filled evening of sheer delight.

Fareham Borough Council has delivered this incredible multi-purpose community facility at a cost of £17 million, fully funded by developer contributions, meaning it came at no expense to Fareham's taxpayers.

Fareham Live will be managed by the expert operators, Trafalgar Theatres, in partnership with Fareham Borough Council, and is set to be the jewel in the crown of the town centre as part of its major regeneration. The theatre will offer a wide range of classes and events throughout the day, as well as fantastic evening entertainment. There is also a new café and bar, providing a space to eat, drink, and relax during the day and before evening performances.

The Council has also opened a night-time route through Fareham Shopping Centre to ensure safe and easy access to Fareham Live. This is the first step in the regeneration of Fareham Town Centre. With numerous pubs and restaurants on West Street and the High Street, this new walkway offers a quick route for theatregoers to enjoy pre- or post-theatre

drinks and/or dinner. It also allows visitors to park at Market Quay car park or use Fareham Bus Station and walk easily to Fareham Live.

Since the initial test events held at the end of September, the town centre has already seen a 10% increase in footfall. Over 30,000 tickets have been sold so far, and with some shows already sold out, this number is only set to rise. Public Enquiry UPDATE:



Starting on October 29th October after Hallam Land appealed the development of 1,200 houses, the decision was transferred from the council to an Inspector who will determine whether it should proceed.

The proceedings are available to view on YouTube. Our local Stubbington Councillors Pal Hayre and Jacquie Needham made both oral and written deputations, objecting on the grounds of insufficient infrastructure.

A decision is expected in the New Year. The proposal includes relocating the medical centre to the development and designating Crofton as the secondary school, which would further strain local infrastructure.

Last minute discussions and negotiations were taking place in a round table type of meeting. Highways was a big issue, we hope the inspector's report to the Secretary of State will be in our favour, preventing the development from moving forward due to insufficient infrastructure and lack of affordable housing.

The Crofton Planning Appeal: Outcome

Residents may be aware that the owners of The Crofton pub, Punch Taverns, had applied for permission to build two three bed houses at the northern end of the car park.

This was refused by Fareham's Planning Committee, but Punch Taverns subsequently appealed the decision which was then considered by an independent government planning inspector.

Hill Head Councillors Kay Mandry and Steve
Dugan successfully pointed out that the car park
already had less spaces than the recommended
guidelines for the given floor area of the pub and
approving the houses would result in the loss of 13
additional spaces and would cause a hazard due to
additional cars parked on the roadside.

During the site visit the inspector witnessed the issues previously highlighted and made the following comments:

"On-street parking adjacent to the driveways of surrounding properties, the public house car park accesses, and the junction between Moody Road and Crofton Lane would restrict inter-visibility between vehicles using these accesses and those travelling along the highway. This on-street parking would also often require vehicles to travel on the opposing side of the highway, particularly along the Moody Road.

Indeed, at my site visit I observed a vehicle exiting a nearby driveway and the manoeuvre which was required to be undertaken due to vehicles parked on the highway. This resulted in the front of the vehicle protruding into the flow of traffic on the highway and avoidance measures undertaken by passing vehicles to avoid a collision. Notwithstanding the number of unrestricted onstreet parking spaces that may be available, additional on-street parking associated with the proposal is likely to exacerbate occurrences of such instances.

The Highway Authority have not raised highway safety objections. Nevertheless, from the evidence before me including my observations, it has not been adequately demonstrated that the increase in on-street parking would not increase the potential for conflict between road users that could result in accidents".

The planning inspector dismissed the appeal.
