Zero Borough Council tax increase for 7 years

We saved Band D residents almost a year's tax

Now we're forced to ask for a modest rise

BUT.. All good things have NOT come to an end

THERE'S been no rise in your district council tax since 2009.

It's because your **Conservative Council** doesn't waste a penny of your money, carefully budgeting to maintain top-class services.

This time, due to on-going reductions in Government grants which will disappear altogether over the next 4 years, we're asking for a very modest rise.

A pre-budget survey showed an overwhelming **85% support** for our strategy,

Council Leader Seán Woodward says: "Despite the Chancellor's austerity burden falling on councils, it certainly does not mean all good things have to come to an end in Fareham.

"Look what we have delivered in those 7 successive zero years;

look what's in store for the future.

"Had we reflected 24% inflation in your council tax during that period, it would now be £173 and Band D residents would have paid an extra £123 over the 7 years.

"Even with the loss of half our grant support from central government, we have managed to preserve essential services and freeze council tax.

"Effectively you have enjoyed saving almost a whole year's Fareham Borough tax bill."

The average Band C property will go up by just 1p a day to enable us to preserve essential services

Band D properties will rise by £5 making the bill £145 per year.

Add the County Council, Police and Fire & Rescue demand and the overall bill will rise £50 pa.

"It's simple to use – just pick out your reason from a list, type a few of the details and it generates an appeal for you to send to the Council."

Kitchen update grant

An application for community funding has been received from Lucy Redfern, community leader at Castle Street Day Centre, for £4,000 to refurbish their kitchen, which needs updating.

This will allow a lunch club to be started, in-house catering to be offered to users and boost bookings. It is hoped to start a take-away service for the elderly.

Total cost of the project is £7,600. to which the centre will contribute £3,600 from fund-raising activities.

New buses

First Solent chose Portchester Castle to unveil its new bus fleet, which is now operating on its two Solent Ranger X4 and X5 routes that connect Portchester, Fareham, Gosport and Portsmouth with Southampton.

The 17 new buses cost £2.75m, bringing the company's total investment in its fleet to more than £15m over the past 3 years.

Flooding closes A27 subway

THE SUBWAY under the A27 has been closed after it kept flooding.

Highways engineers who are trying to solve the problem say it is caused by a geological fault.

Meantime, Councillor Geoff Fazackarley and InTouch team leader Trevor Alford, pictured right inspecting the subway, have helped several elderly residents across the busy road.



Trevor pursues flood issues

RESIDENTS have complained about flooding behind the shops in West Street, Portchester.

InTouch team leader Trevor Alford has been working hard to try to resolve the problem and others in the area.

He has taken the matter to Hampshire County Council, but it is a complex issue involving three bodies – the County, private landlords of flats either side and the water company

He said: "We are trying to sort it, but flooding is caused by pipes on everyone's land and trying to get someone to pay is a nightmare."

Cranleigh: Geoff and Trevor will fight bid to spoil our countryside



THEY'RE BACK. Despite past planning refusals and huge opposition from councillors and residents, persistent Persimmon Homes are pushing to develop the Cranleigh Road site.

This time they have reduced the number of homes from 135 to 120 after submitting an envi-

ronmental statement (ES) before Christmas.

Portchester East Conservative Councillor Geoff Fazackarlev and InTouch team leader Trevor Alford pledged to fight to save the green fields.

Geoff, pictured at the site with Trevor, said: "In July 2006 the Borough Council won a planning appeal against Gudgeon Developers Limited for 230 homes in the same area.

"The Secretary of State rejected the appeal and agreed with the Council planners that it would damage the character of the area and blur the boundaries between Portchester and Fareham."

Portchester West Councillor Nick Walker spoke at the appeal in 2006 and asked the minister to reject the application because it would:

Intrude into open countryside

•Spoil the coastal view from the sea

·Lose an important local gap

 Impact on nature conservation interests ·Overload Cranleigh Road with extra traffic

Trevor Alford said: "The area north of Cranleigh Road is designated as countryside, meaning it is not suitable for any form of development, which puts more pressure on our identity as a beautiful place to live.

"There are major stresses on the housing waiting list, but that's why Welborne is so important.

"We would like to see a nature reserve for our community to support the children of Portchester." The application goes to the committee in March.

Enjoy a good run for your money

A NEW way to keep fit has received a community grant of £3,000 to get it up and running.

Portchester resident Andrew Smith applied for the grant to enable a Parkrun to be set up in the Borough.

Parkrun UK is a non-profit organisation that stages a series of free weekly 5km timed runs in areas of open space around the UK.

Parkruns are open to all, are safe and easy to take part in and there are currently over 340 in operation in the UK. Runners of all abilities are welcome. Events take place every Saturday morning at 9am and are free to attend.

They are run by teams of community volunteers The route for the Fareham Parkrun is theeasy access trail around Cams Hall estate and golf course, starting and finishing at the Cams Mill pub.

ANTI-SOCIAL owners who don't clear up their dogs' mess are being targeted in a

Council clamp-down.

InTouch team leader Trevor Alford says dog fouling and litter are the most frequent complaints he has to listen to.

He said: "The Council has adopted a strategy to try to educate dog owners, while allowing offenders to be financially penalised."

It is seeking a Borough-wide Public Spaces Protection Order to apply fixed penalty notices and will raise these from £75 to £100 There are over 600 dog waste bins around the Borough and owners are advised to use them or pay the penalty.
